C.O. TOP SEVEN

NO BULLING, SEXUAL HARRASSMENT, CADET TO CADET CONTACT, DISCRIMINATION, FRATERNIZATION, HAZING, OR VULARITY

- 1. **[B]ULLYING** is unwanted, aggressive behavior among peers that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. Bullying generally involves a pattern of behavior repeated over time. Bullying includes, but is not limited to, such action as: making threats, spreading rumors, assaulting someone physically or verbally, or intentionally excluding someone from a group.
- 2. **[S]EXUAL HARRASMENT** is a form of discrimination that involves unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, or other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature that interferes with an individual's performance or creates an intimidating or hostile training environment. This policy is gender neutral and applies the same way to male or females at the training. There is no place in the USNSCC for off color jokes, teasing about sex or sexuality, inappropriate behavior in the showers, flirting, requests for dates, or any form of physical or sexual contact.
- 3. **[C]ADET TO CADET CONTACT**. Keep your hands to yourself. And no one at this training may touch you without your permission.
- 4. **[D]ISCRIMINATION** is unjustly making distinctions in the treatment of different categories of people. Prejudice is pre-judgement, bias, or partiality; it is a preconceived opinion not based on actual experience. The USNSCC is a meritocracy here, you will be judged solely on your performance. There is a no place in the USNSCC for ignorant biases, bigotry, or pre-judgement based upon race, color, sex, gender, age, ethnicity, national origin, religion, sexual orientation, or disability.
- 5. **[F]RATERNIZATION** is an unduly familiar relationship between superiors and subordinates that is prejudicial to good order and discipline. Fraternization weakens the integrity of the chain of command by creating the appearance of favoritism in our training environment.
- 6. **[H]AZING** is any action taken or situation created to intentionally cause embarrassment, harassment, or ridicule, or to intentionally risk emotional and/or physical harm. It's still hazing even if the victim is a "willing" participant. At its core, hazing is the act of embarrassing someone primarily for the purpose of embarrassing them.
- 7. **[V]ULGARITY:** is the use of obscene, profane, or offensive language directed at others in a way that attacks, belittles, or berates them. Using vulgar language to target, demean, or insult others is unacceptable in the USNSCC. All cadets are expected to communicate respectfully, ensuring that their words do not create a hostile environment for others.



1st General Order: To take charge of this post and all government property in view.

Hint: One view in sight

2nd General Order: To walk my post in a military manner, keeping always on the alert and observing everything that takes place within sight or hearing.

Hint: You've got two feet and two eyes

3rd General Order: To report all violations of orders I am instructed to enforce.

Hint: 3 strike violations and you're out

4th General Order: To repeat all calls from posts more distant from the guardhouse than my own.

Hint: 4 quardsmen call for you repeatedly from a distance

5th General Order: To quit my post only when properly relieved.

Hint: Five o'clock is normally quitting time

6th General Order: To receive, obey, and pass on to the sentry who relieves me, all orders from the Commanding Officer, Command Duty Officer, Officer of the Deck, and Officers and Petty Officers of the Watch only.

Hint: Including you, that's six people or groups of people standing watch.

7th General Order: To talk to no one except in the line of duty.

Visual hint: The 7 looks like an opened mouth in profile.

8th General Order: To give the alarm in case of fire or disorder.

Visual hint: If you turn it on its side, the 8 looks like the top of one of those old-fashioned alarm clocks.

9th General Order: To call the Officer of the Deck in any case not covered by instructions.

Hint: Nein (pronounced nine) means no in German. Nein = **No** instructions.

10th General Order: To salute all officers and all colors and standards not cased.

Hint: the highest officer rank is O-10, not in wartime

11th General Order: To be especially watchful at night, and, during the time for challenging, to challenge all persons on or near my post and to allow no one to pass without proper authority.

Hint: 11pm is nighttime, a challenging time to stand watch.
